Dear Open Goat Show Exhibitor,

The Troy Fair will be offering an Open Dairy Goat show, for registered and non-registered goats at the 2022 Fair. Entry Fees will be \$4.00 per animal and classes and premiums are as listed below. Rules and Health Requirements for all goats entering the fairgrounds have also been included.

The Open Dairy Goat Show at Troy Fair will be held on Friday, July 29 at approximate time of 1 pm. Entries will be submitted online at FairEntry.com by July 1, 2022. Late entry fee after July 1 is \$10.00 per animal and classes. No entries excepted after July 20, 2022.

The show will run Dairy Fitting and Showmanship, Dairy Breeds followed by Group Classes.

Dairy goats will arrive between 4pm - 8pm on Thursday, July 28^{th} for the Open Dairy Goat Show on Friday, July 29. Goats will not be allowed to unload until all pens are cleaned and someone is there to check-in. They will be housed in the sheep barn.

Gate Pass Forms are available. Open show exhibitors are entitled to free passes for Thursday, Friday and \$1.00 passes for 2 family members. If you are showing 5 to 9 goats you are entitled to three \$1.00 passes and showing 10 goats you are entitled to four \$1.00 passes.

Show is Friday, July 29, 2022 1:00 pm

Arrival Time

Goats need to arrive between 4:00 - 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 28. All goats must be checked for signs of disease before they can unload.

Check Out

Animals will need to stay until 6:00 p.m. on Friday, July 29. Unless otherwise discussed with show committee.

It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to clean all their pens before leaving the fairgrounds. Any Exhibitor who does not clean out their pen(s) will be charged a \$20 fee or risk forfeiting their right to show in following years.

Ownership

All goats must be owned by the exhibitor by July 1, 2022.

Entry Deadline

Entries are due online by July 1, 2022.

Bedding, Hay and Feed –All bedding, hay and other feed is to be furnished by the exhibitor

Exhibitors are responsible for the removal of manure and bedding from the barns to a central collection point. Wheelbarrows are suggested – bring your own or share.

- Clean boots or closed toe shoes

Section 11: Pennsylvania Goats Requirements:

- 1. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
- 2. A USDA ear tag with a US shield; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags are not permitted be exhibited in Pennsylvania- please call the department at 717-783-6851 if such a tag is encountered).or
- 3. A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear--state postal code and letters/numbers--and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
- 4. A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
- 5. Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal.

Recommendations:

 A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022.
 All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

Section 12: Out of State Goats Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
- 2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
 - 4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes: a.
- a. USDA ear tag with a US shield; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags are not permitted be exhibited in Pennsylvania- please call the department at 717-783-6851 if such a tag is encountered). or
- b. A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear--state postal code and letters/numbers--and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
- c. A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
- d. Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal. •

<u>Tuberculosis testing requirements:</u>

- No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accreditedfree by the USDA.
- All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The

negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

• All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

<u>Recommendations:</u> All out of state goats must meet all criteria listed above as "requirements". PDA has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state goats.

Troy Fair Open Goat Show Rules and Regulations

- 1. Entries online by July 1. Late entries will be accepted after July 1 with a \$10.00 per animal and classes. No entries excepted after July 20, 2022.
- 2. An entry fee of \$4.00 per animal must be paid online.
- 3. Open Exhibitors do not have to show their own animal. They may have their animals shown by another person representing them.
- 4. Exhibitors must provide own feed, bedding, buckets, hoses, hay feeder and general supplies. No Metal Shovels or utensils to be used on the barn floor.
- 5. No exhibitor may have more than 3 entries in each class. Exhibitors limited to 10 animals each.
- 6. Drugs administered to livestock prior to or during the fair for the purpose of controlling disposition or showmanship performance is prohibited.
- 7. Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the Chairman, to accept the stall assigned without controversy, to keep animals in an attractive appearance, and to cooperate with the Department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show. Any unsportsmanlike conduct will result in dismissal.
- 8. Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competition on the grounds no later than 8:00 P.M., Thursday July 28. All such animals shall remain on the premises until 6:00 p.m., Friday, July 29 unless otherwise discussed with the show committee.
- 9. No bucks allowed. Disbudding of all animals is encouraged.
